"This Wednesday at 5 p.m. I would like to see all Puerto Ricans out on the streets. Let's go protest. There is no excuse." This is what Bad Bunny said on his Instagram the day before hundreds of thousands of Puerto Ricans filled miles of a major highway in San Juan in protest against Gov. Ricardo A. Rosselló, who has resisted persistent calls for his resignation.

Bad Bunny is one of the many Latinx artists that represent and speaks openly about social issues. Along with his rise, the rise of Latin Music, and the rise of new social media platforms such as TikTok, which has amassed over 800 million monthly users. 

Results

- Latinx Musicians have managed to have their voices heard by people from two ends of the political spectrum; Vox vs. Fox News.Both media outlets posted about Cardi B and Bernie Sanders' encounters and interviews.
- The U.S. Latin music streaming revenues has increased from \$130 million in 2016 to \$220 million in mid 2019. Showing the advancements that Latin music is making with technology.
- TikTok was the most installed app of 2019, with more than 1 billion views every day and more than 800 million monthly users. This makes it the future for creators. Thus, the potential audience that may hear the voices of Latinx creators is exponential.

Conclusions

Social media platforms have successfully allowed Latinx artists to create social change in a more accessible manner. With a more saturated audience on TikTok, many Latinx artists can display their talents and spread their ideologies.
